Weekend Board Report

The Gainesville State School weekend took place on June 2-4, 2023, with setup occurring on Thursday, June 1st. The setup went incredibly smooth, with the school OIG officials coming to Whaley UMC to inspect the trailer ahead of time which greatly sped up the on-site setup the next day. Trailer, boxes, and the equipment, including placing the mandated 410 forms on the outside of each box have been totally reorganized by this team, and it was great. Both Mr. Hill and Mr. Claybrook commented that Epiphany is by far the best prepared group of volunteers they deal with. We did have an issue with the drummer's trailer in that his tow vehicle was loaded with tools that were not allowed in the facility. So, we had to cross load his stuff into the team trailer and bring it in that way. Added time to the setup. We had fantastic cooperation from Mr. Hill and Mr. Claybrook during the setup and the full weekend. As happened with #42, both attended every minute of the weekend, and we had ample and helpful staff support the entire time. Med calls and bathroom breaks were not a disruption to the schedule as in years past. Only one student had a visitation, and he returned promptly to the room. Only one student left due to discipline issues, and he



wanted to come back, but was not allowed to. We pray he returns to a future weekend. I ordered new Bibles for this weekend, and they worked great except that the cover is blue. Several of the guys commented that blue was a gang color. I am ordering future ones with black covers. The team had purchased coordinating purple shirts for Saturday, and we looked sharp, but the kids were oblivious (as it should be.) The Epiphany leadership team was composed of Lay Director Patty Jackson, Assistant Lay Director Nicole Collingsworth, Weekend Coordinator Jaqui Smith, and Spiritual Director Rev. Katie Kline. The team was very small, but mighty, composed of 25 inside members and 1 runner/ driver. All food was procured from local restaurants, and the driver brought it to the facility for the three meals we served. Fifteen members served on our five table families. We had a 5-person music team, all of whom served on tables as well, not the best practice, but needed this weekend. Continued on next page.

Our Lay Director Patty held 4 inspirational team meetings prior to the weekend. The meetings were again lightly attended, which presented a problem, as some of the new and returning members were unsure of their roles and responsibilities on the weekend. The team manual was followed closely during the team meetings, and as mentioned Mr. Hill attended to provide PREA and OIG training to all that needed it. He also carefully briefed the team on the composition of the Stars attending the weekend, as Gainesville is now largely a sex offender campus, although two of our tables had capital offenders this time, and more are anticipated in the future. The Thursday evening team meeting was focused on our "Listen, Listen, Love, Love" theme, and the commissioning ceremony was a blessing. At the conclusion, after the Epiphany ceremony was closed, an optional communion ceremony was held. On Friday, we had 24 students from two different dorms in attendance, and all but one completed the weekend. We had five Superstars that had attended the last Epiphany, and they did a spectacular job. We did have some Stars that had been on previous Epiphanies as well due to staffing challenges. We need to instruct those boys not to disclose what is coming up next and spoil the surprises that take place. The table dynamics were out-

standing, and the Stars and Superstars were very well behaved and showed kindness and great manners throughout the weekend. Ages ranged from 13 to 18. I observed few instances of fooling around or showing any signs of disrespect. The boys did get a little restless on Sunday afternoon as they realized their time with us was coming to a close, and the team needs to do a better job holding them in check. All the conference room speakers presented well-rehearsed and thoughtful talks, following the Team Manual guidelines closely. There were accompanying PowerPoint presentations, and the talks were of suitable length; none exceeding the 15-minute suggested time. The Life of Christ series was well presented and received, and the boys seemed to follow the story well. The prayer chain was one of the longest I've seen, nearly circling the gym twice around! The skits were well done, despite some of the team having to participate due to a small number of Super Stars. We have purchased new costumes for the skits and they worked great. The music team did a great job, providing appropriate music at the proper times, especially before talks and during the worship segments. There was a recorded secular song played during the forgiveness ceremony that was inappropriate, and that will be addressed at our UAC meeting. As mentioned, the school staff was very present, cheerful, and supportive. We felt very secure in the room, and there was obvious positive and respectful interaction between

the students and staff. There was an issue when the team withdrew, and the Stars read their letters. The team was unprepared to sing quietly and there was still too much noise in the room. Despite that, the students seemed touched by what they read. The birthday ceremony was improved from the last weekend, but we forgot to sing Happy Birthday! A great change was that St. Elsewhere's lunch tables are now adjacent to the boys, so lunch is a much more communal affair. There was plenty of time provided for interaction between the Stars and their table spiritual directors interacted well and relayed prayer requests. We would have benefited from additional spiritual directors presenting as Rev. Kline was carrying the load most of the time. The changes that were instituted to the forgiveness ceremony, although following the manual to the T, were poorly communicated to the team, and the ceremony was hard to see given our seating configuration. This is an area that will need to be addressed on future weekends. We did need more recreation as well to burn off some energy. The

Cross ceremony was conducted well and while the students were presented their wooden crosses (all but two accepted), they were confused when those crosses were gathered up and they were given a paper cross to keep. They were informed that the wooden cross would be given to them when they were processed out of the facility. Again, we would like to see if there could be a ruling from the state TJJD on this matter to allow them to keep their wooden crosses as in years past. We had a great 4th Day speaker, and his message was received well by weekend Star guides, and the the Stars. The message, "You are Loved", You are Forgiven, and "You are Called" resonated throughout the weekend. Despite a very small team with many folks performing multiple roles, the weekend was a success and the school management and staff very grateful for our presence. We did have many new team members this time, and that led to some confusion, but the kids did not see or feel that at all. Hi everyone,

I wanted to give you an update on Epiphany #26. We really didn't know what to expect. So much time has passed. The team was pleasantly surprised that there were no new rules and that the new staff was very receptive to us. We were really tested this weekend. We were met with aggressive warfare from the enemy. Everything that could go wrong did go wrong. One thing after another. No matter what kind of chaos the enemy tried to cause it did not affect what God had sent us to do.

My job this Epiphany was in the prayer room but I spent some time in the conference room. The first thing I noticed is these boys really, really like to sing. They couldn't get enough of it. It. The second thing I noticed is how respectful they were to the team at the Family Tables and how they tried to listen actively to the speakers. The Talks and Meditations were powerful! It was evident that the boys were impacted by them. The prayer boxes on the tables began to get filled almost immediately. They started to request to come to the prayer room to be prayed over. What a privilege to be able to pray over these young men.

On Saturday we give the stars a birthday party and they get a cake with their name on it and we're allowed to bring them a gift.(Things like shampoo, soap, etc. Some

of the boys don't have anyone so they don't get money on their books to buy these things) many of these boys have never been given a birthday party and several had never received a birthday cake. It is often an emotional time for some of the boys.

On Sundays, the boys receive a letter from each of the team members. The rest of us leave and only the clergy stays with them. We sit on the other side of the screen and give them time to read their letters privately. Usually, we sit quietly, but someone on the team started to quietly sing a hymn. The other team members joined in. As soon as that song was finished, they would start another song. It sounded like a beautiful choir. The presence of the Holy Spirit permeated the place. It was a very special moment.

Soon after it was time to go home. All 17 boys of Epiphany number 26 received their crosses and proclaimed their love for Christ. And one boy was allowed to sing a song to us with all the other boys encouraging him along. They all plan to learn this song together so they can sing it to us at the next reunion when we will get to see their sweet faces aga

in. It was one of the hardest Epiphanies I've ever worked, but it also was one of the most rewarding.

Praise the Lord for his great faithfulness! And I rejoice that so many hearts, minds and lives have been changed. All glory to our Lord and Savior Jesus Christ.

As many of you saw I requested prayer on Saturday because we were under such heavy spiritual attack. And one of the ways we were attacked the most was through our health. One team member was taken by ambulance to Lubbock during the night. She was admitted but she was released today and she's going to be okay. Almost all the rest of us were limping around from an assortment of different illnesses. We were so busy every waking moment. We never had time for any team photos. The two that I shared are only of a few of us that managed to gather before we left. You can see we are battle weary. The battle was hard won and it took its toll on us physically. But it could not steal our joy. I cannot thank you enough for your prayers. How they sustain and encourage us. And I thank you for how generously you give your money to support this ministry. This is important work and we couldn't do it without you.


